

Allison G. Hawthorne, Co-founder and Board Member of Homefields before becoming Program Director of Community Services Group, York and Adams County, PA. Education: BFA in Related Arts. Communication, Kutztown University. If there is a person who has roots in Lancaster County, it is Allison. She traces her American heritage back to 1860 when her ancestors purchased 300 acres in Mount Joy to start a new life. Allison's family now lives on three of the original acres. Allison's familiarity with the developmentally disabled came early. As a three-year-old, she loved to walk over to Esther and Kathryn's (sisters who lived next door) and share in a tea party, bake bread, learn how to hook a rug, and-occasionally-to eat warm, unwashed spinach from the garden. What Allison did not know at the time was that Esther was mentally retarded.

unteer, and private time has been devoted to people who are handicapped. Allison's life experiences and desire to change shortcomings in the system came together in the concept of Homefields. She sees art as an integral part of life and recognizes Homefields as a creative, holistic environment for people with mental retardation. A place where health, vocational, rehabilitational, and recreational needs are not considered separately. A place that can adapt to fill gaps in services or to meet changing client needs, such as retirement issues. Allison was one of the first people, after hearing Homefields' founding concepts, to work toward making them a reality.

Andrea says that she doesn't have anyone with exceptionalities in her family but she is one of the most special people we've met. As far back as she can remember, Andrea has cared about people who often appreciate a little extra attention. A younger Andrea, still living in Philadelphia, met a teacher who worked at Widner School, a school for exceptional students. This teacher was looking for a capable babysitter and Andrea accepted the job. Andrea grew to love her charge, a little girl who had autism. The reward was great for Andrea; her experience crystallized predilections into a lifetime goal.

During her senior year at high school, a co-worker's parent, a special education teacher, noticed Andrea's obvious capabilities. The teacher learned of Andrea's interest in people with developmental disabilities and introduced her to Martin Markovitz, the then PA Director of Best Buddies. Andrea learned from Martin that there was no Best Buddies chapter in Lancaster County, where she would be attending Millersville University. Given the direction of Martin, the enthusiasm and support of Liz Simpson, (the then Field Director of Best Buddies, PA), Andrea was set to start a pilot chapter at Millersville. By the fall of 1996, Andrea had the Best Buddies Chapter at Millersville University in place. After all this work, she was nervous now that it was time for everything to come together. But just a half mile away were six Buddies living at Homefields, ready to accept new friends into their lives. And Andrea was doubly blessed by finding support in Homefields' Residential Provider, Community Services Group and Supervisor, Becky Zercher. Becky, along with staff, guided Homefields' residents and College Bud-

dies through the in-BEST BVDDIES" tricacies and complications of beginning a new relationship. Now everyone at Homefields has a College Buddy and Andrea has a friend in Victor, a very social man who loves telephone conversations and visits with Andrea. He's looking forward to sharing a train to Philadelphia with her, and he likes

frequent bus trips with his Buddy.

Andrea says, "Usually friends can't be made in professional life. My friendship with Victor is unencumbered and uninhibited." She says she's lucky but we know how hard she's worked. Thank
